Keep in mind, just like any other crime victim, you deserve to have treatment and assistance available to you after the sexual assault. This booklet has specific information for rape victims with visual impairments. Remember, you do not have to deal with this alone.

The Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) applies to most public and private agencies. This includes: hospitals, police departments, courts and counseling centers. These agencies should be able to assist with additional accommodations to help you get the services you might need in the aftermath of a sexual assault...ask if there is anyone on staff with experience working with persons with disabilities, particularly visual impairments.
